- Forgive those who have caused hurt in your life.
- Allow a mentor to influence change in your life and possibly be an advocate for your future.

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HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

This Bible study guide was designed with you, you, you, and yes, you too in mind. There's a little something for everyone. It is considered to be a 3-in-1 style. CHOOSE YOUR CUSTOM EXPERIENCE

S.O.A.P. Study

S.O.A.P. is an acronym for Scripture, Observation, Application, and Prayer. This experience encourages you to meditate on a specific passage from the Bible, document your observations, discover ways it can be applied to your life, and pray about what has been revealed to you during this time.

Word Study

A word study is a great way to not only learn new words but discover their meanings in the context that they're being used (e.g. blue skies versus feeling blue), the original language they were written in, and how they connect with other passages throughout the Bible.

Question Study

Answering the questions related to each passage will prompt a personal, reflective experience. They will also provide opportunities to discover how Scripture applies to your past, present, and future. Some answers can be pulled directly from Scripture, but for a majority of the questions there is no right or wrong answer.



CONTENTS

01 WHO

Onesimus, a runaway slave, is the main subject of the letter. Paul, a Jewish man from Tarsus and apostle, is the author. Philemon, Apphia, Archippus, and their church plant are his audience.

02 WHAT

Onesimus ran away from his master, Philemon, for fear of punishment after wronging Philemon. Paul writes this letter (epistle) to Philemon asking for mercy on Onesimus' behalf after his conversion.

03 WHEN

Paul wrote all of his epistles in 1st century AD (post-resurrection) with this letter being written while in prison.

04 WHERE

Onesimus is visiting Paul, who is in prison, possibly in Rome, while Philemon, Apphia, Archippus, have started a church plant in Colossae.

05 WHY

This letter encourages readers to evangelize and reconcile relationships between Christians. Onesimus, whose name means "useful", did not live up to his name prior to his conversion. Now that Onesimus is a Christian, Paul cosigns that he is a useful brother in Christ and can be helpful in sharing the gospel in Colossae.

APPENDIX

This appendix includes a few tools that we use and highly recommend for anyone doing a Bible study.

YOUR BIBLE

You should ALWAYS start with YOUR OWN BIBLE! It's God's inspired Word and the best way to connect with Him without outside influences on your interpretation. Also, the more you use your Bible, the more comfortable you'll get with it and the more likely God's Word will be written on your heart. In addition to Scripture, your Bible usually includes one or more of the following: a table of contents, cross-references (usually in the margins), topical indexes, a concordance, maps, and more.

STUDY BIBLE

A study Bible is similar to your normal Bible but sometimes includes historical research and/or commentary. To expand upon the historical research, study Bibles typically include everything in your regular Bible PLUS other resources such as timelines, charts, outlines, more maps, and commentaries. Commentary is simply someone else's opinions. ALWAYS REMEMBER that you want to develop your own opinion before you look at someone else's.

ONLINE TOOLS

As great as a tangible Bible is to have in your grasp, online tools can also come in handy, whether you're using your computer or mobile phone. A few tools that we recommend are:
